Eskimo Whaling History


- Eskimos have been hunting whales from Arctic waters since approximately 1,700 years ago for clothing, food, tools, shelter, and fuel
- Commercial whaling began in the 19th century after continuous European contact and resulted in dramatic social and demographic changes for Alaska Eskimos in addition to the near depletion of the bowhead whale stock
- Alaska Eskimos continued subsistence whaling after the collapse of the whaling industry by 1910

Eskimo Whaling History

- The International Whaling Commission (IWC) was established in 1946 and exempted subsistence whaling until 1977. The IWC imposed a zero quota for the 1978 season
- The Alaska Eskimo Whaling Commission (AEWC) was established in 1977 to represent the needs and interests of Alaskan Eskimo whaling communities. The AEWC achieved a limited hunt for subsistence purposes for the 1978 season
- While most whaling captains today believe that the current quota system is an appropriate method for managing bowhead harvests, some believe that the existence of a quota is unnecessary given their ability to self-manage their harvests
 - Quotas may cause the hunting of larger whales and riskier hunting behaviors


Eskimo Whaling Population History

- The historical worldwide population estimate is approximately 50,000, with 10,400-23,000 in the Western Arctic stock
 - The population dropped to less than 3,000 at the end of commercial whaling
- 1,149 whales were hunted during 1974-2011



Oil and Gas Industry MMPA Incidental Take Permits

- Bowheads are now affected by industrial development off the north coast of Alaska, especially in the Beaufort Sea, where large-scale oil and gas leasing began in the 1970's
- In addition to the permits issued for nine offshore oil fields, NMFS has issued at least 18 Incidental Take Permits, Incidental Harassment Authorizations, and Letters of Authorization for the take of bowhead whales due to oil and gas related activities since 1982
