Nada Wolff Culver is the incoming Vice President, Public Lands and Senior Policy Counsel at the National Audubon Society, where she will be leading Audubon's public lands program and its efforts to defend and innovate implementation of bedrock wildlife conservation laws, as well as their implementation through onthe-ground decisions.

Prior to joining Audubon, Nada was the Senior Counsel and Senior Director of Agency Policy and Planning at The Wilderness Society, providing technical advice and support to citizens and conservation groups working to protect their public lands, while influencing national policy.
