# Gulf Coast Hazard Mitigation Plan Review

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## Introduction

Recently, increased emphasis has been placed on non-structural and nature-based hazard mitigation solutions, including the restoration of wetlands and floodplains, as cost-effective alternatives for flood hazard mitigation that also help achieve conservation goals like maintaining biodiversity. FEMA hazard mitigation grant programs could provide potential funding that could pay for the restoration and protection of critical natural infrastructure and improve outcomes and reduce costs from the next disaster. For example, FEMA's new Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) program will make \$500 million dollars available to states, U.S territories, Indian tribal governments, and local communities for predisaster mitigation activities. The FY2020 program priorities include incentivizing projects that incorporate nature-based solutions.

Funded mitigation activities, including nature-based projects, must be done in accordance with priorities set out in state, tribal, or local hazard mitigation plans. Some state and local governments identify restoration and protection priorities in their plans. Most state plans recognize habitat loss as a hazard, or at least as a consequence of hazards, but fewer discuss habitat conservation and restoration as a hazard mitigation strategy. If they did so, more opportunities would be created for investments in nature-based solutions. And, while many state hazard mitigation plans reference federal funding for restoration projects, fewer plans include state-level funding or state-directed projects for habitat restoration. Local plans are more directly tied to community needs and goals and thus may provide an important opportunity for integrating conservation and restoration goals.

The goal of this project was to equip advocates for nature-based solutions with information to play an active role in the hazard mitigation planning process by:

- identifying best practices in inclusion of nature-based strategies in local hazard mitigation plans in the Gulf Coast region, and
- providing a schedule indicating which entities prepare these plans and a timeline for their next update.

# Methodology

The research phase included an analysis of local hazard mitigation plans from across the Gulf Coast region. We used a keyword search approach to identify to what extent local hazard mitigation plans are incorporating conservation and restoration of wetlands and floodplains and green infrastructure as goals or explicit hazard reduction strategies. The research methodology included the following steps:

1. Identify and review hazard mitigation plans. The research team identified 58 local hazard mitigation plans representing 65 counties (and many municipalities within) for review. Selected plans included plans for the 13 counties served by the Houston Galveston Area Council (H-GAC), plans from counties within the Guadalupe Basin in Texas, and all available plans from the remaining coastal counties in the Gulf Coast states (see Table 1). Plans were generally located on local government websites (e.g., county webpage). In some cases, the plan was found on a unique website (e.g., the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency District 9 Region plan that includes that includes George, Hancock, Harrison, Jackson, Pearl River, and Stone Counties is housed on its own webpage). We include links to pdf versions of the plans in Table 1.

A key word search approach was used as an initial screen to identify natural and nature-based goals and objectives and strategies and actions. The key words used included, wetland; natur-(e.g., natural and nature-based); green (e.g., green infrastructure); conserv- (e.g., conserve, conservation); preserv- (e.g., preserve, preservation); restor- (e.g., restore, restoration); stream; and living shore. We searched the entire plan for the key words, including all plan sections (e.g., risk assessment, mitigation strategy, plan process). We documented all identified relevant goals, objectives, and mitigation actions in each plan summary.

The key word search was followed by a more detailed review of the mitigation strategy section of the plan to ensure all relevant mentions and actions were included in the data and to better understand the context of each action and document any additional relevant information. Some of the plans include a description of each action, others just list actions without additional information.

- 2. **Document relevant goals and actions**. We documented nature-based goals and strategies for mitigating the risks posed by natural hazards. We took a conservative view of relevant goals and actions to include in our analysis. We included only goals and actions that explicitly discussed natural infrastructure or nature-based strategies (e.g., habitat conservation or restoration projects, green infrastructure projects, protection policies, etc.). We did not include the following types of actions:
  - references to buyouts or acquisitions that just focused on the purchase of structures,
  - detention ponds (or other types of retention) that did not mention habitat restoration,
  - construction/clearing of drainage structures or creation of drainage management plans (including ditch/culvert maintenance) that did not mention habitat restoration,
  - drought tolerant landscaping plans or ordinances (or vegetation management for drought),

- beach re-nourishment,
- erosion control plans/programs (or projects) that didn't mention habitat,
- tree management, when focused only on pruning, and
- fire vegetation management.

In addition to documented goals and actions, we noted additional information about each plan including:

- Year
- Planning Timeframe
- Date of Next Planned Revision
- Responsible Planning Agency (including the Planning Team and Identified Stakeholders)
- Relevant Goals and Objectives
- Relevant Actions
- 3. **Create plan summary documents**. We created summary documents for each plan reviewed. Each plan summary notes the responsible planning agency and entity that prepared plan as well as the timing for the next plan revision. The summaries also include all of the information collected from the plan review.
- 4. **Create a summary of relevant actions**. Finally, we created a summary of relevant actions to identify the range of different types of actions identified, including examples.

## Results

Table 1 shows the local hazard mitigation plans reviewed, the year the plan was finalized, the responsible planning entity, and the expected date of plan update. The planning entity data indicate who advocates may contact if they want to engage in the planning process and the expected date of plan update indicates when these groups can expect the planning effort to begin.

Table 1 also includes a relative rating of how well the plans incorporate nature-resource related goals/objectives (0 = no, 1 = yes, 2 = well developed), nature-resource related actions (0 = no, 1 = yes, 2 = well developed), and specific projects or actions (0 = no, 1 = yes). More information on each plan is included in the plan summary (Appendix C).

We found that a number of counties had well developed natural resource-based goals and actions in their mitigation action plans (Table 1). Counties in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama had particularly well-developed mitigation actions. We cataloged relevant individual actions into three categories, including actions related to preserving land, actions related to restoring habitats, and actions related to developing plans and programs (Appendix A).

We also identified a number of model examples of nature-based actions (Appendix B). These actions may serve as particularly good examples for other communities that are interested in incorporating nature-based actions in their mitigation action plans. We categorized these into a number of categories, including:

- Actions that identify specific projects
- Actions that identify less detailed specific projects
- Actions that are explicitly related to wildlife/biodiversity
- Actions that would support development of future projects
- Actions that encourage participation in or support for State or Federal Programs
- Actions related to partnerships
- Actions to develop wetland protection regulations
- Actions related to other planning or regulatory options

## Conclusion

Land trusts and other conservation organizations may also play a significant role in implementing hazard mitigation plans by identifying and carrying out projects that restore wetlands, create living shorelines, protect floodplains and aquifer recharge zones, restore and manage wildfire-resistant native vegetation, and other nature-based actions. These activities may be funded through a variety of funding sources, including FEMA hazard mitigation grants in some cases.

# Appendix B: Model Examples

We identified a number of model examples of mitigation strategies. We categorized these into a number of categories, including:

- Actions that would support development of future projects
- Actions that encourage participation in or support for State or Federal Programs
- Actions related to partnerships
- Actions to develop wetland protection regulations
- Actions related to other planning or regulatory options

These actions may serve as particularly good examples for other communities that are interested in incorporating nature-based actions in their mitigation action plans.








Figure 1.05, Plan Stakeholders







Figure 1.2, Mitigation Planning Committee Membership (Continued)
