Why a World Café?

- The World Café method is designed to create a safe, welcoming environment in which to intentionally connect multiple ideas and perspectives on a topic by engaging participants in several rounds of small-group conversation.
- The method is particularly useful when you want to be sure to explore a topic from multiple perspectives, to ensure that everyone in a room contributes in a conversation, and/or when you want to encourage participants to make new connections and build trust.
- Great method to distill insights through discussion among larger groups.



At our World Café:

- We have 6 Tables each with a facilitator team who will stay at those tables.
- Participants will join a Table for a 30-minute round.
- We will have 3 rounds so think about which of the 6 Tables you want to join you won't be able to get to them all!
- During each round you will learn and share your insights so be prepared to actively contribute your thoughts, listen, and have fun!
- One member of the facilitator team will then report back to the plenary so that you will hear some of what was discussed at each table.



At each Table:

- Participants will get a short overview of basin/region/theme from facilitator team.
- Participants will share and discuss what has been accomplished by the regional/basin Network this last year under *each pillar of the strategy* (i.e. empowerment, peer-to-peer learning/ capacity building, research cooperation, collective engagement at key meetings/ events);
- Share and discuss what do we want to achieve this coming year under each pillar;
- Ideas and opportunities for inter-basin engagements?








Table 3: Orange-Senqu Basin








Table 5: Exploratory/ Development Stages



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

What does it mean to 'Invest in Women'?

- Changing the status quo requires ACTIVE efforts to both remove barriers and create opportunities.
- Both mainstreaming and targeted approaches.
- Within each of our organizations we must make visible the gender pay gap and take efforts to address.
- Within our programs we must examine how resources are allocated using the tools of gender analysis, including collection of sex-disaggregated data, and gendered budgeting and financing.
